FREESTYLE TERRAIN may contain jumps, hits, ramps, embankments, jibs, rails, fun boxes, half pipes, quarter pipes, snow cross, freestyle bump terrain and other terrain variations (generally known as features). Freestyle Terrain is marked as containing small, medium and/or large features. Choose terrain that is appropriate to your abilities. Do not stop or stand where you are not visible from above.

RESPONSIBILITY & SAFETY TIPS

WARNING

Under Colorado law, a skier assumes the risk of any injury to person or property resulting from any of the inherent dangers and risks of skiing and may not recover from any ski area employee for any injury resulting from any of the inherent dangers and risks of skiing including changing weather conditions, existing and changing snow conditions, bare spots, rocks, stumps, trees, collisions with natural objects, man-made objects or other skiers, variations in terrain, and the failure of skiers to ski within their own abilities. Colorado law includes cliffs, jumps, extreme and freestyle terrain in the inherent dangers and risks of skiing.

Skiing is a positive environmental experience. Please help us care for the environment. Colorado Law prohibits riding the lifts or skiing while under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Colorado Law requires that you give your name and current address to a ski area employee before you leave the vicinity if you are involved in a collision resulting in an injury. Witnesses are encouraged to contact a ski area employee. Do not enter closed lands adjoining a ski area. Winter Park has zero tolerance on closed trail violations. Violator's pass will be revoked for the season. Do not disembark from a chairlift except at a designated area.

YOUR RESPONSIBILITY CODE

Always stay in control. You must be able to stop or avoid people or objects. People ahead or downhill of you have the right-of-way. You must avoid them. Stop only where you are visible from above and do not restrict traffic. Look uphill and avoid others before starting downhill or entering a trail. You must prevent runaway equipment. Read and obey all signs, warnings, and hazard markings. Keep off closed trails and out of closed areas. You must know how and be able to load, ride and unload lifts safely. If you need assistance, ask the lift attendant. Do not use lifts or terrain when impaired by alcohol or drugs. If you are involved in a collision or incident, share your contact information with each other and a ski area employee. Winter sports involve risk of serious injury or death. Your knowledge, decisions and actions contribute to your safety and that of others. If you need help understanding the Code, please ask any ski area employee.

Snowcats, snowmobiles, snowmaking and other equipment may be encountered at any time, stay clear. Activities other than downhill skiing or snowboarding may be prohibited or restricted within the ski area. It is your responsibility to contact Winter Park senior management for details. NO SLEDDING ALLOWED. Skiing or riding with a child in a front or backpack is strongly discouraged. Inverted aerials not recommended.
